
Culminating services: "As for Me"



began a good work in you will be faithful to complete it; greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world. You don't need to see, you just need to believe. It's time.



Pastor receives leadership award

Antioch Baptist Church North Pastor Cameron Alexander was one of five Atlanta icons to receive the Atlanta Metropolitan College Foundation Leadership Award during a gala held April 26 at the Twelve Hotel.

Other winners were, WSB-TV anchor Monica Pearson, Atlanta Public School Superintendent Errol Davis, media mogul and philanthropist Ted Turner, and civil rights activist Xernona Clayton.

Gaining financial knowledge

Dozens of Antioch Baptist Church North members turned out June 23 for helping getting their financial house in order.

"Get Financially Fit," sponsored by the Concerned Black Clergy, Cred-Ability, and Wells Fargo Bank, included workshops on saving and budgeting, the basics of credit, purchasing a home, and preserving and retirement planning.

The first bit of good news came as CredAbility Financial Education Manager Deatra Riley shared her personal story with credit cards while in college.

Fortunately, Riley said, the Credit Card Act of 2009 now prohibits those under age 21 from obtaining a credit card unless they are able to prove income and an ability to repay.

Parents breathed a sigh of relief.

During the saving and budgeting workshop participants helped each other with cost cutting techniques. They applauded Anthony Patrick, a resident of Luke's Place, who now has two bank accounts as a result of employing the discipline and commitment Wells Fargo officers Pamela Cross and Stephen Norris hammered in throughout their presentation.

"We knew we needed to help people" be empowered during these harsh economic times," the Rev. Frank Brown, president of CBC, told the crowd.

He thanked Antioch Pastor Cameron Alexander and Dea. Joe Beasley for helping organize the effort.

Participants left with a wealth of information, handouts, CDs to help set up a budget, and specific followup activities for fixing errors on credit reports. Those experiencing credit challenges or in danger of losing their homes were able to set individual follow-up appointments, and the first 30 participants received \$25 gift cards a helpful boost to their personal budgets.

said that Joshya reminds them of what God had done - giving them land for which they did not labor, cities they did not build, food they did not plant.

The people's attitude in many ways mimics ours today, he said, and if we're not careful, we too will start to believe God hasn't done anything for us.

"In 2012, we have just gotten beside ourselves," the Rev. Alexander said. "But the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof and they that dwell therein."

Joshua understood this and went on to tell the children of Israel that he and his house would serve the Lord.

On this men's culmination day, Alexander said that we need more men like Joshua, more "as for me" men, men who don't shy away from their responsibilities, men whose wives and children know they can depend on them and look up to them.

At the 11 a.m. service, he said that there comes a time when all of us must chose which side we're on. "It's hard to be supportive of both sides," he said. "It's like a man trying to straddle two horses going in opposite directions."

Sprinting into the Olympic Trials

David Dickens, a former University of Georgia Bulldog Allstar and Antioch Baptist Church North member, recently qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials.

Dickens clocked a season-best 45.66 to win the 400-meter dash at a UNC-Charlotte "last chance" meet and qualify for his first Trials, which began June 21 at the University of Oregon in Eugene.

After his qualifying race, it took a couple seconds for Dickens to soak up what he had just accomplished.

"I really didn't know how fast I had run," he said. "When the time popped up. I just lost it. I must have said. 'thank you God' at least 20 times



Dickens was a constant threat on the Bulldogs' track during his career, setting the school's indoor 200 record and becoming part of four of the 10 fastest outdoor 4x400 relay finishes in UGA history.

In addition to holding down a full time job John Hancock, Dickens bounced between weekend home meets at Georgia, Georgia Tech and Auburn, driving up on Saturday mornings before the meet and then back to Atlanta following his events.

The training, which usually included Dickens holding his own stopwatch, was without a coach on site. He gets workouts from his former high school coach, Chris Malcolm.

Dickens, who dropped his time to 46.14 a week before racing in Charlotte, garnered a provisional "B" cut time in the 400 and a spot at the Olympic Trials.

Homerzell Gentry: The woman behind "These Hands"

For as long as she can remember, Homerzelle Gentry has tried to live out Proverbs 3:5: Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding".

And so it was as she contemplated writing this years' Easter presentation "With These Hands...The Redemption Story."

One morning while reading scripture, Gentry said it became clear the role our hands play in our daily lives for good and bad.

"Adam used his hand to create Sin," she thought to herself. "Jesus used his pierced hands to redeem us from sin."

It was then that Gentry knew that this was the message God wanted her to share on Easter Sunday, that would minister to the congregation and, at the same time, glorify Him.

The daughter of a Baptist preacher and pastor, Gentry was very familiar with the redemption story. Now she was seeing it in a whole

new light.

She began writing the vision.

Gentry said that it wasn't always crystal clear that God would lead her down a theatrical path. After graduating from high school with honors, she earned a BA degree in both business and computer science from the University of Houston.

And although she would go on to receive management certification from University of Georgia and certification in Child Evangelism, she has no formal training in theater.

"Rev. Alexander gave me

the opportunity to present these productions and it has opened a door in my life that I never knew existed," Gentry said.

She said she also owes credit to a team of Antioch members - Kurt Gilbert, David Vaughn, Dorcas Ford-Jones, Bonita Williams ,Tamara Ross, Judy Rawls, and Shawn Oates - who help with rehearsals, dance and scenery.

"I couldn't do this without them and appreciate very much all that they do for our youth," she said.

A native of small town Hearne, TX, Gentry moved to Atlanta in 1997.

"The very first Sunday after my move, I attended worship services at Antioch," she said.

She joined several Sundays later and soon began working with the Youth Ministry, a gift she discovered some 15 years ago.

Today, she serves as Antioch's Nursery Coordinator, MADD Coordinator and member of Christian Edu-

cation.

"Working with Antioch's Youth is the best," she said. "They are always willing and eager to present God's message."

As she writes, Gentry said she can see the productions come to life and often envisions specific kids playing specific parts.

"Whenever this happens, I will ask that particular youth to perform the part," she said.

Gentry said she believes it was God's plan that this year's presentation called for a majority male cast.

"I explained to them that this was not a performance, but ministry, and that as they spoke, they should focus on telling the story so that it ministered to the congregation," she said. "To those who know the story, it would be a reminder. To those who did not, it would be Christian education."

The end result, she said, was proof that following God's direction leads to God Himself."
