

It was billed as a salute to 55 years of preaching but it was more than that, really.

ator Valencia Seav told the crowd.

It was February 19 and dozens of Antioch Baptist Church North members jammed the senate floor to watch as legislators gathered to honor their pastor who this year will celebrate 55 years of preaching and 40 years at Antioch.

When Pastor Alexander stepped forth, he looked over the crowd and quipped: "With these many people it's very inviting for me to ask for an offering."

He moved quickly, however, to a more serious note, calling the Senate to task for how they were treating the state's veterans.

"We're more than numbers and digits." Alexander said. noting he's a veteran. "We're people with feelings, and we hurt. We sent you here to help us, and we expect you to do that."



He said he had to be true to his calling and warned the legislative body that "there's an eternal session that's more significant than this session."

"That day is called Judgment Day. You don't know exactly when that day will come, but you need to put it on your calendar every day. God is going to ask you, 'what did you do with the time that I gave you on earth? Did you make life more miserable for people, or were you compassionate and loving?' There will be no more Democrat or Republican; you will be sent left or right!"

Pastor Alexander told the Senators that he had hope in some things he'd heard. "Take care of us so that we do not become the land of the spree and the home of rage. We must be brave enough to be free and free enough to be brave."

At a reception following the presentation, Sen. Seay she was on the Clayton Country School Board when Pastor Alexander and Dea. Joseph Beasley encouraged her to run for the senate.

"I had only served one term, and I was enjoying it, but they told me I needed to run for the Senate, and I stand today representing District 34," she

Pastor Alexander was part of the movement that helped change the nation's Jim Crow laws, Seay said, and urged everyone to get involved in the legislative process by paying attention to the bills and getting on the agenda to speak

As Pastor and Sister Alexander cut a congratulatory cake, he quipped, "We didn't get a chance to do this 54 years ago; we didn't have a cake at our wedding."

Alexis is a senior at Mays High School where she served as a sponsor during the school's homecoming game. She is a member of the Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) Club.


At Antioch, she serves with the junior ushers and sings with the M.A.D.D. for Christ Choir.
