Pastor's Anniversary: "We're well fed"

Every called preacher knows that feeding the sheep is crucial to kingdom building.

And at Antioch Baptist Church North, "we have been fed," the Rev. Rodney Turner declared during the Aug. 7 morning service celebrating Pastor Cameron Alexander's 42nd anniversary.

Turner, pastor of Mt. Vernon Baptist Church, preached from the third chapter of Jeremiah.



you pastors, men in the flesh who will love you like I love you," said Turner, quoting scripture. "They are going to present you living bread, the word to nourish and build you up."

He said that God didn't promise to send people who would turn the pulpit into a playground, the church into a circus or those who would conform to this world or chose political correctness over what is biblical.

"I'm going to send you pastors, overseers, lead-

Because of Pastor Alexander, he said, "We are not spiritually weak but strong in the Lord.

11 a.m. "A gospel that works"


For 42 years, Pastor Cameron Alexander has preached the uncompromising truth.

He has taught us that faith without works is dead. He has taught us to begin and end each year in prayer. He has taught us that God does not require us to be successful but that we be faithful.

In short, God's word has been the thrust of his ministry, the Rev. Kenneth Alexander told those gathered to celebrate the Pastor's 42 anniversary.

Alexander, presiding minister of the Lakewood Mission, said that for 42 years his father has preached from the same book that tells us to trust in the Lord with all our hearts.

"He has taught us that

when we're in the midst of a storm, don't panic because God doesn't have to do anything by Friday," he said.

But does that gospel work?

Alexander recounted the story of Paul and Silas who had preached the word and cast out demons only to be thrown in jail. But at midnight, they were released.

"Paul and Silas had a gospel that worked," he said.

Margaret Weaver: Don't Quit

Sis. Margaret Weaver knows what it feels like to want to give up.

"I have had some real challenges as a business owner," she said, slightly emphasizing the word "real" as she talked.

"But what I have seen is God comes through and He does in magnificent ways."

Sis. Weaver, a psychologist and longtime Antioch member, has the educational training and spiritual background to deal with such pressures better than many. In an effort to help others manage adversity and persevere in the face of difficulty, she penned "Don't Give Up."

The book, published earlier this year, is the first in a series of devotional books by Sis. Weaver, director of Antioch's Evangelistic Task Force.

"When faced with adversity, it is sometimes tempting to give up, quit, surrender to despair, and accept defeat," Weaver writes on her website. "But, hopefully, you will be encouraged to keep pressing on during

those tumultuous, and, at times, seemingly relentless storms of life."

Sis. Weaver's book offers what's in short supply in her industry: support with a spiritual foundation. It's what brought her to Atlanta. She was working in Philadelphia when she heard about a Christian-based counseling program in Atlanta.

"I knew it was my life's assignment," Sis. Weaver, a former music major, said of psychology.

Sis. Weaver said the book is doing surprisingly well and that she's particularly thankful to Antioch Members who have purchased the book. Many people, she said, are buying multiple copies and giving them to others.

Sis. Weaver, who has been in private practice since the early 1990s, said she was encouraged for years to write a book by her parents, Mrs. Mae Weaver and the late Rev. George E. Weaver, author of three books. Sis. Weaver said she started collecting material for the

book several years ago from speeches she's given over the years.

"My hope was the book would glorify God and second, it would impact people," Sis. Weaver said.

Sis. Weaver said much of the wisdom in the book comes from Rev. Cameron M. Alexander and his teachings at Antioch. She called Alexander a "master motivator" and recited some of his more encouraging phrases.

You've got more going for you than you've got going against you.

So does Rev. Alexander get a share of the royalties?

"He has taught tithes and offerings, and I am doing that," Sis. Weaver replied with a hearty laugh.

Her message to others?

"With God, all things are possible. Keep going and trusting in Him."

Sisters By Choice host Pink Ribbon Walk

Mother Emma Kelly is a cancer survivor; so are Sisters Janet Hill and Karen McKinney.

They know better than anyone, perhaps, that African-Americans are more likely to die of breast cancer than other ethnic groups and not only is it often diagnosed later and at an advanced stage, studies show that tumors in black women are more aggressive.

To help spread the word, Kelly, her daughters, Jocelyn Curry and Stephanie Scott, Hill and McKinney. all members of Antioch Baptist Church North, were among thousands of survivors and supporters who turned out July 16 for the second annual Sisters By Choice Pink Ribbon Walk.

The walk, held annually to help raise funds for and awareness about breast cancer, is sponsored by Sisters By Choice, a breast cancer survivor support group begun in 1989 by renowned surgeon Dr. Rogsbert F. Phillips.

Because early detection is key to full recovery, women are urged to do monthly breast exams and get annual mammograms.

The concert featured an ecumenical choir composed of Atlanta churches of different denominations and

When hard sayings are preached, will you stay or go?

Jesus, being God's son, never gets sick. He never gets old. He never dies.

And as long as he was performing miracles, he couldn't move for the crowds who followed him, Pastor Cameron Alexander preached recently.

"They loved him," he said. But in a sobering second-Sunday sermon taken from John 6:53-69, Alexander said "Jesus came to do more than perform miracles."

In fact, he said, many of us today still want Jesus just to be a miracle worker. If, for instance, Jesus keeps us in good health, keeps us in a good job, we'll be diligent in serving him.

"Let me declare today that God is not a bell hop," Pastor Alexander said.

Despite the miracles, he said, Jesus eventually lost his crowd.

"They were fine when he was just a miracle worker," he said, "but they left him when he started identifying who he was, the son of

God."

Pastor Alexander said that the truth doesn't always draw crowds but the truth will set you free.

Jesus, he reminded the congregation, said that he knew from the beginning that some didn't believe in him.

"From that time many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him." (John 5:66)

They fell away, Alexander said, not because of bad press but because they wanted a magician, not a master.

And so just as Jesus had done with his disciples when he asked "Will you also go," Pastor Alexander turned to Antioch's ministers and asked: "If the truth drives everybody away and we're not popular anymore, will you also go?

He asked the deacons and then the congregation, "If we stay in this Bible and it rubs people the wrong way, will you also go?"

Rev. Johnson retires from law enforcement

Dozens of Antioch Baptist Church North members, family, friends and colleagues turned out Aug. 13 to celebrate Rev. Craig Johnson's retirement.

Johnson said that he wanted to retire while he was still in good health, could provide for his family and practice his calling to preach, teach and someday pastor.

Middle-of-the-Bible Preaching

Harkening back to revivals of yesteryear, five sons of Antioch preached July 27 from the Scripture found in the middle of the Bible, Psalm 118:8. "It is better to trust in the LORD than to put confidence in man."

Below is a brief synopsis of each of their messages:
